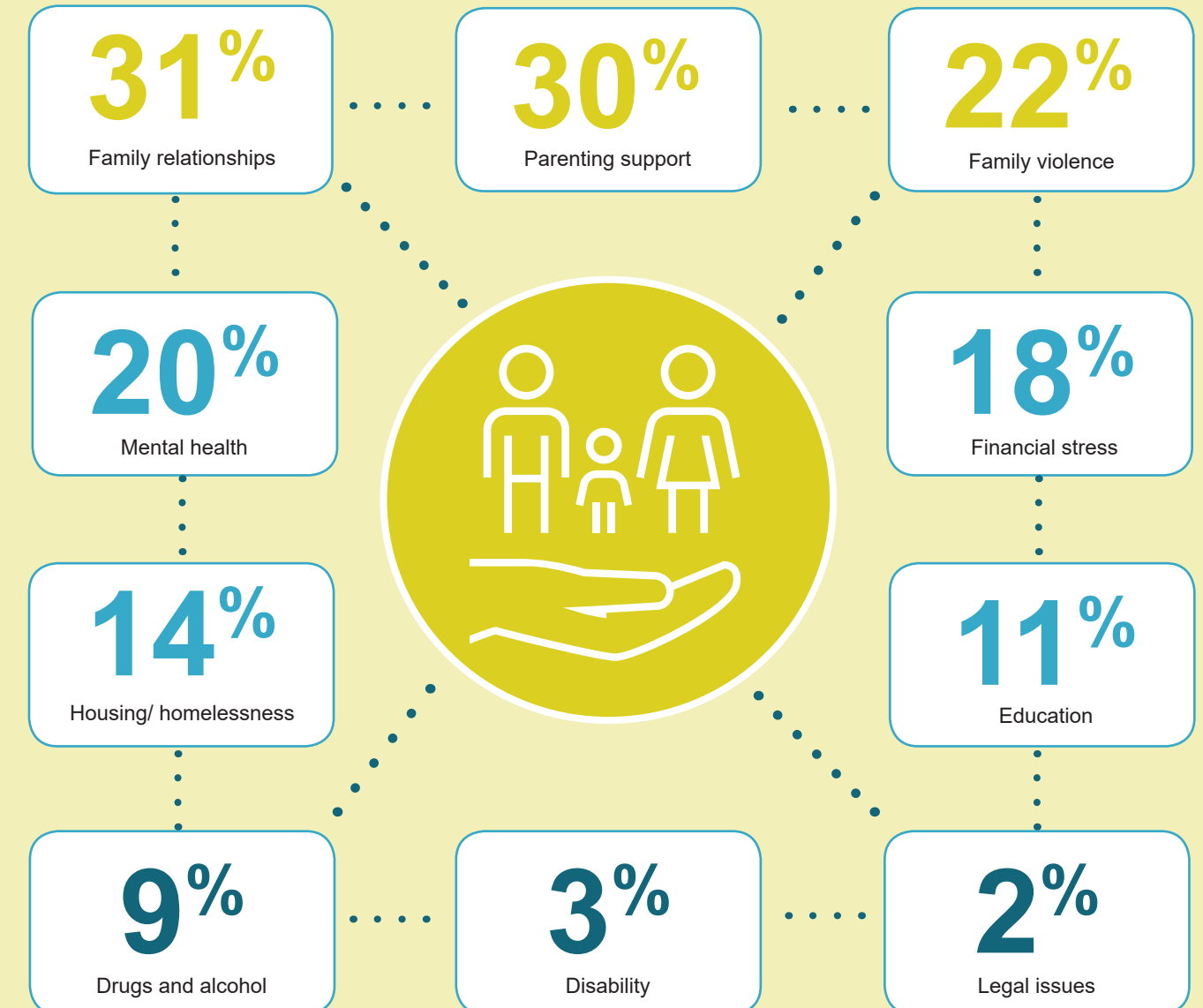

Family Support

SANITA AND CAROLINA

“I didn’t feel alone... Barnardos are my family.”

“I was unhappy. I went through a lot. There was violence every day. I had a three-year-old daughter. When he used to hit me, I couldn’t tell anyone because of my culture. That’s why I had to run away. I found out Barnardos could help me so I came here.

They supported me with everything financially and I got somewhere to live. I got legal support and counselling for me and for my daughter too.

It was hell. Now it’s heaven. Because of Barnardos.

I’m not scared anymore. Mostly it was having someone to tell me – “you can do it Sanita”.

I used to go to counselling with Carolina before going to court.

Carolina used to tell me “Put your head up. You are strong. You have to look after your daughter”.

I was crying every day and had nightmares every night.

She told me it’s ok to cry.

When I came to Barnardos, I couldn’t speak English very well. They helped me with my legal stuff – helping me write things – and going to court with me – they were always there – always helping me.

I was able to study when I was here. They looked after my daughter. I had a social worker. I had a counsellor. I didn’t feel alone – even though I don’t have any family here. Barnardos are my family.

I’m so happy now. My daughter is eight years old. She is doing so well at school – her favourite subjects are maths and science. I finished my studies and I have a job and a flat. Everything is good.”

“I pass on my knowledge, like my mother passed onto me.”

“I’m a proud Warramungu woman. I’ve lived in the Illawarra since I was nine years old and I’m passionate about the community I live in.

I’ve worked in my community since I was 17 and I think I always will. I love what I do.

I support families in the community with children 0-6 years of age. I assist them with their parenting capacity and I advocate for them in any areas where they need help.

I’m currently working with one mum to bond with her baby. She suffered post-natal depression so we are working on attachment.

I visit her at home every week. We play with the baby, read and sing nursery rhymes – things to encourage the baby to talk. I help her with feeding, sleeping and routine. We even do baby massage - I use a lot of stuff I used on my babies.

She is a young mother and I tell her to follow her instincts and she is slowly gaining confidence. I pass on my knowledge like my mother passed onto me when I had my daughter Georjah-Lee.

I’m also assisting some parents getting their kids enrolled in school. I had a parent who was worried about the expense. I helped her budget to buy something for school every two weeks throughout the year rather than all at once. Now she has almost everything on the list and her child is ready to start school next year.

I work with mothers and children coping after experiencing domestic violence. I help them seek counselling and just reinforce that support. Often when children are upset, they can’t communicate how they’re feeling, so they will lash out or throw tantrums. We help mums understand and deal with their child’s behaviour.

Most of the families I work with know me from the community. This helps a lot because there is a level of understanding and trust.

Sometimes they feel shame that things aren’t going so well, but we understand that things can go wrong and that’s why we’re here.”

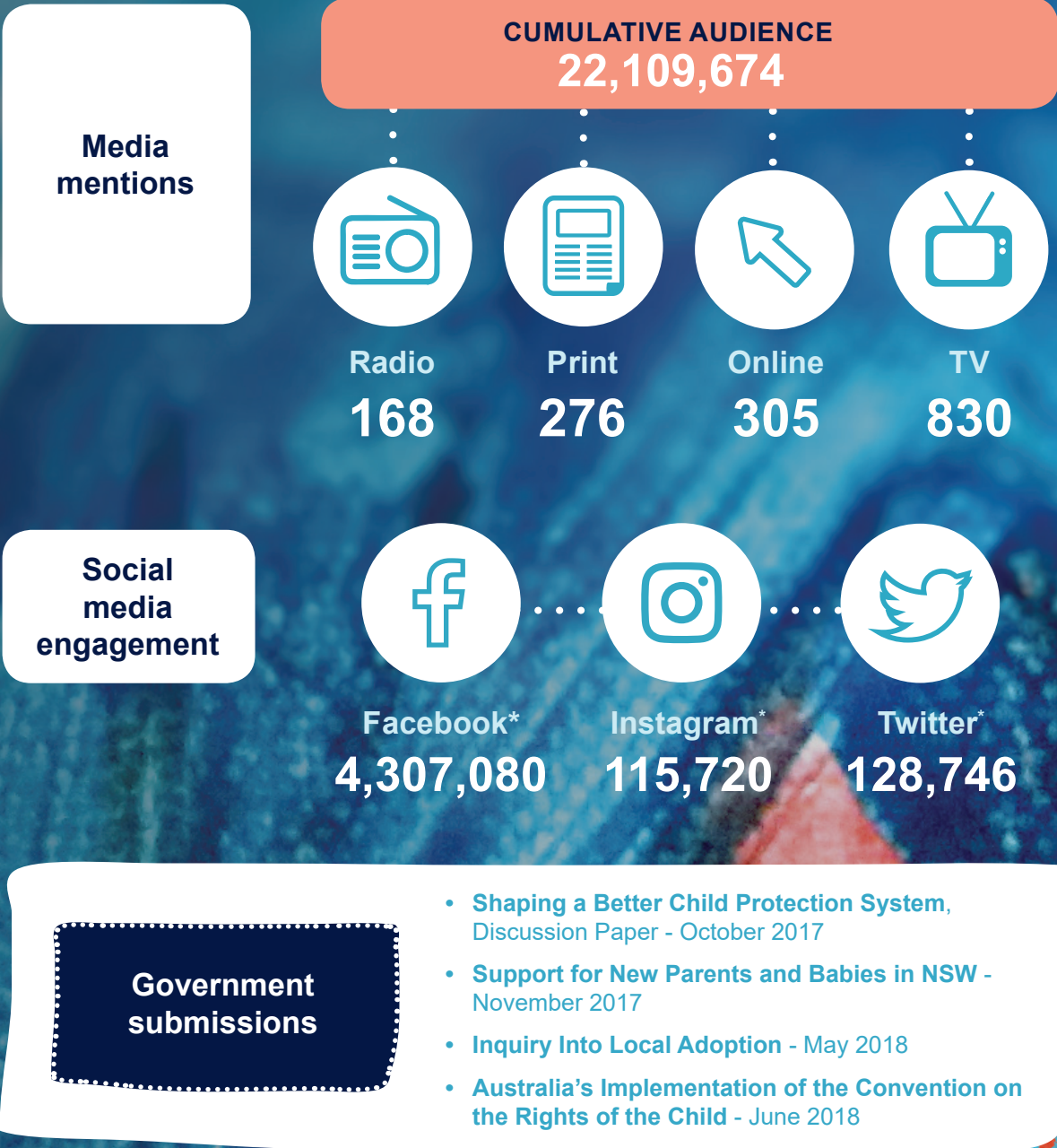

“We can’t imagine our lives without them.”

Australian Story’s ‘Modern Family’ aired nationally on ABC TV during Foster Care Week in September 2017.

The program featured Barnardos foster carers John Guthrie and Dennis Cash who have fostered seven teenage girls over the past two decades.

It was the most popular episode in the history of the program receiving over three million views.

“The reaction was extraordinary. We weren’t expecting it at all. People are still stopping us in the street. Wherever we go – people know us and know Barnardos. I’m amazed at how many people saw it.

It has definitely helped open up the conversation about foster care. People who didn’t know anything about fostering always come up and ask us a lot of questions about how it works.

It’s also been great to reflect on the impact we had on these amazing young women that make up our family and the impact they’ve had on us. We can’t imagine our lives without them.

We are so proud of how far they’ve all come and what they’ve achieved despite the trauma they experienced in their early lives.

Since the episode went to air, we started caring for a baby as temporary foster carers with Barnardos. There is always a shortage of carers and we had the time – so we have begun a new chapter in our lives as foster carers.

We’re really glad we shared our story. It seems to have touched a lot of people. If it’s encouraged even one person to consider fostering a child then it’s been more than worthwhile.”

“Barnardos is a family and family comes first.”

“I got into youth work about seven years ago. I attended a program in Penrith and one of the youth workers gave me the opportunity to do a leadership program. I thought I would have to do a trade until I found out you could make a living out of helping people.

I really enjoy helping people. Not everybody has been given the same opportunities in life. Growing up I was very fortunate in having great parents and a really stable environment but then I started to realise that not everyone was the same. I felt I had to give back.

What drives me is seeing young people with no self-worth achieve what they want out of life. I get to work with them and see them grow and become their own person in that time.

I’ve been working with Tristan for a year and a half. He has a great sense of humour and is very intelligent. He likes to keep me on my toes.

My favourite thing about Tristan is how confident he has become in who he is. When I first met him he was isolated and withdrawn.

Since then I’ve seen him engage with everyone here and have very honest conversations. Tristan knows he can talk to me about anything. We make sure anyone who comes here – no matter what their identity or culture – feels safe to express themselves. We have young people from very diverse backgrounds. The biggest thing our young people learn here is acceptance.

Our young people know we’ll be here when they need us. They know us by name. They know us as people. Because at the end of the day this is just a building. It’s the people here that matter.

I love that Barnardos is based around family. When I come to work I know that I’m going to be supported, the same way I support my young people. They practice what they preach. Barnardos is a family and family comes first.”

KARINDA



“They opened my eyes to a better way of parenting.”

“I moved to Nyngan five years ago with my husband and three young children. We didn't know a lot of people and don't have any family in the area. I was feeling overwhelmed with the kids and didn't know how to cope with my children or where to go for help.

My life was very stressful. All my children have global developmental delay so they are all around the same age mentally. I was extremely stressed out and frustrated.

Family and Community Services (FACS) came in to do a welfare check on us because they were concerned about how we were going. They said Barnardos could help us and I decided to take a chance.

I completed the SafeCare parenting program with Barnardos. They taught me how to interact with my children and how to redirect negative behaviour into positive behavior, give the children boundaries and set up a routine. It opened my eyes to a lot of information I didn't know before.

I didn't realise there were so many dangers in the home. They helped me child-proof the house. They taught me how to know when my child is sick and whether they need the doctor or if it is an emergency and they need to go to the hospital.

My son also has ADHD and Barnardos helped me get support from the school and get doctor's assessments and specialist appointments for his speech as well as occupational therapy.

I am more confident in my parenting. Being more calm and level-headed makes it a lot less stressful at home for my kids. When I'm calm – they're calm.

Family means everything to me. We wouldn't be anywhere without family. If it wasn't for Barnardos I don't know where I'd be. They have helped me grow so much from where I was to where I am now. They opened my eyes to a better way of parenting and a better way for me to be the best I can be. I feel a lot better about the future and my children's future.

I didn't realise what community meant until I came to Barnardos. They opened up so many doors for us. I'm so glad I took that first step. We've really found our home.”

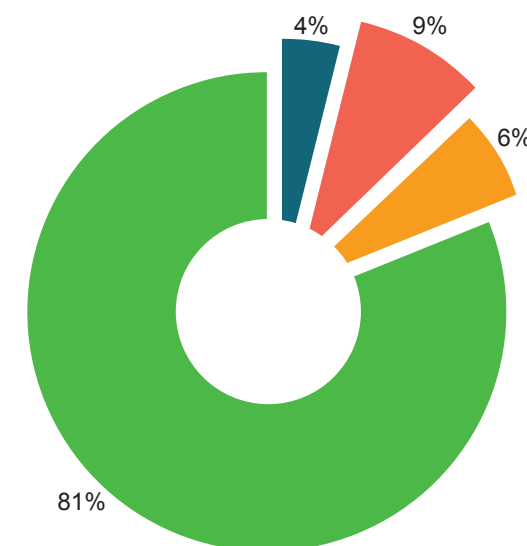

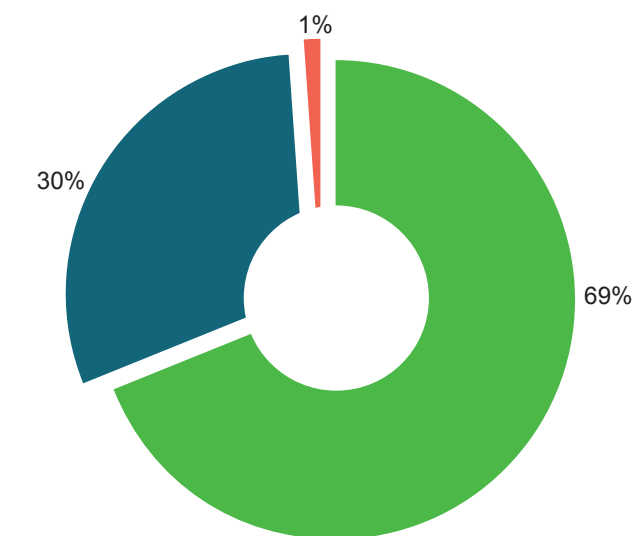
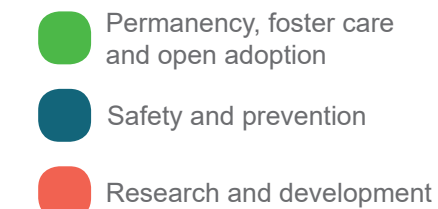
